It is with great pride that I present to you the Pullman Police Department 2012 Annual Report. Our focus in 2012 was to move forward with our Community Policing practices through community outreach, employee professionalism, and a department that is responsive to the community. There is no question that all of our accomplishments and successes can be attributed to the hard work of a dedicated and professional staff and a supportive community.

Some of the highlights in 2012 include:

- Part A crimes against property offenses decreased 62%
- Part A crimes against person offenses decreased 23%
- Part A crimes against society offenses decreased 34%
- Part A crimes total decreased 55%
- Enhanced social media outreach
- Patrol car replacements were ordered with traditional black and white color scheme

2012 SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

Assault with Serious Injury

January 12: A 22 year old Pullman man reported breaking his leg during a fight at the Delta Tau Delta Fraternity. The broken leg was described as major and surgery in Spokane was required. An investigation did not result in any arrests. The altercation was influenced heavily by alcohol.

Large Private Party Escalates to Brawl

February 11: A private party on McGee Street got out of hand and resulted in numerous fights and property damage to residences and yards in the area. Investigation revealed that WSU and UI football players were involved. No criminal charges were brought, but increased communication between the Police Department and the respective football clubs ensued.

Barricaded Suicidal Subject

February 23: A resident on Sunnyside Hill threatened suicide with a firearm and barricaded themselves in their residence. The area was cordoned off and negotiators were able to talk the subject out of their house after approximately four hours. There were no injuries and no criminal charges were filed.

Credit Card Fraud

May: A credit card fraud investigation revealed that an employee of a local motel used hundreds of customers' credit card information for personal purchases. The suspect was ultimately arrested and charged.

Armed Robberies

June 13: Two armed robberies were reported. Employees at New Garden Restaurant, 400 S. Grand Ave., reported that at closing they were confronted at gunpoint and robbed of their wallets by a lone gunman who fled on foot. Shortly thereafter, a motorist reported a lone gunman attempted a car-jacking on Bishop Blvd and then fled on foot. The suspect was never identified.

Drug Arrest

June 30: A search warrant was executed on Maple Street resulting in the arrest of a 22 year old after a large quantity of drugs was seized from the residence. Seized were ninety grams of marijuana, two pounds of MDMA (ecstasy), psilocybin Mushrooms, and a large amount of cash. Charges were referred to the Whitman County Prosecutor.

Assault with a Firearm

August 16: An argument in the 600 Block of Opal Street resulted in a 29 year old Pullman man pulling a gun and pointing it at another man's head. The gunman was arrested and the case was forwarded to the Whitman County Prosecutor with charges of unlawful possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and unlawful aiming a firearm.

Assault with a Shotgun

August 19: A residential domestic roommate situation escalated to a point where a 26 year old racked the pump action on a shotgun and pointed it at his roommates threatening to shoot them. The suspect was arrested and charges were forwarded to the Whitman County Prosecutor for Assault in the 1st Degree.

Alcohol Related Falls Resulting in Major Injuries

August: A 22 year old male fell off the roof of his residence in the 400 block NE Howard St.

September: A 20 year old male fell out of a 3rd story window of the Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity.

September: A 22 year old male fell off the 3rd story balcony of the Boulder Creek Apartments.

November: A 19 year old male fell off an outside balcony of the Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity.

PERSONNEL

Commissioned Police Officers

In March, Detective Bill Orsborn retired after nineteen and one-half years of service with the Pullman Police Department. That Detective position was left vacant until July, when Officer Scott Kirk was selected to move from Patrol to Detectives. In June, Officer Brandon Koe left the Pullman Police Department to relocate to another part of the State.

The College Hill Officer positions were staffed by Officers Chris Engle and Heidi Lambley during the spring semester and they both rotated back to patrol in June. Officer Ruben Harris was assigned to the College Hill Officer position in July.

Due to budgetary reductions made during the year, the vacancies created by Detective Orsborn and Officer Koe were maintained in one of Day Shift Patrol positions and one of the College Hill Officer positions.

Support

Support carried two part-time Records Specialist vacancies from January through May. One of those positions was upgraded to a full-time position and was filled with the hiring of Josh Sanders in June. The second position was held vacant the remainder of the year due to mid-year budget cuts. Records Specialist I Stefanie Hagemann successfully completed her probationary period in November. All Records personnel participated in a team building exercise in April.

Training

Commissioned officers are required to obtain a minimum of 24 hours of in-service training per year. The total number of in-service hours received by the 27 commissioned Pullman Officers in 2012 was 2,535 for an average of 94 training hours per officer. In March, Officers participated in a multi-agency regional riot refresher training at University of Idaho.

Support staff received a total of 260.5 hours of in-service training during 2012 for an average of 20 hours for each of the 13 support staff personnel.

DRUG ABUSE RESISTANCE EDUCATION (DARE) / SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

The Police Department has presented the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program to Pullman School District students since 1989. Officer Shane Emerson presented DARE training to 5th grade students and assisted all Pullman schools as the Police Department's designated School Resource Officer (SRO).

Officer Emerson participated in a forty hour Washington State School Resource Officer Training Summit and presented approximately eighty, one hour lessons to over 200 students from three different schools. Officer Emerson has an assigned office at Pullman High School, but he works with students, faculty and staff from all Pullman schools. Officer Emerson assisted in over 200 cases involving the schools, students, and/or staff during 2012.

QUAD CITIES DRUG TASK FORCE

The active participants in the Quad Cities Drug Task Force (QCDF) in 2012 were Pullman PD, Colfax PD, Clarkston PD, Whitman County SO, Latah County SO, and Moscow PD. The QCDF made 14 arrests for drug and narcotics violations during the year in the City of

Pullman. The Task Force opened 78 cases and closed 61 cases; there were 32 cases that resulted in 1 arrest and 10 cases that resulted in multiple arrests. The QCDF is currently working with other task forces and Federal agents on a large case that was initiated by Pullman PD Detective Scott Patrick. The investigation has so far resulted in eight arrests and several pounds of methamphetamine have been seized.

SPECIAL WEAPONS AND TACTICS (SWAT) TEAM

The Pullman Police Department continues to participate in the multi-agency Whitman County Regional Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) team. The SWAT team consists of 14 Tactical Officers from the Whitman County Sheriff's Office, Washington State University Police Department, and Pullman Police Department. SWAT team members receive specialized training to resolve critical and potentially dangerous incidents. Some examples of the types of incidents in which the team is deployed are apprehension of violent offenders, barricaded suspects, hostage and/or sniper situations, and service of high risk warrants.

Officers assigned to the SWAT team (tactical officers) complete 150 hours of specialized training annually. Many of the tactical officers have instructor level certifications in disciplines such as defensive tactics, firearms, and less lethal force options. The team works closely with crisis negotiators (one from each represented agency).

In May, Whitman County Regional SWAT began consistently training with Moscow PD SWAT, enhancing regional compatibility and capability. In June, Spokane PD SWAT provided the team a three day course in advanced SWAT tactics free of charge. In 2012, Whitman County Regional SWAT pre-planned for a variety of potential events. The team was called out for one response in January 2012.

January 12

The Whitman County Sheriff's Office requested SWAT to serve a high risk search warrant in the town of Oakesdale. The investigation involved a stolen shotgun possessed by a suspect with a violent and combative history. With the assistance of negotiators, the occupants of the residence came out and were detained by SWAT without incident. SWAT checked and secured the residence and turned the scene over to investigators.

VOLUNTEERS

Reserve Police Officers

Reserve Officers Dennis Pratt and Derek Lambert continued their field training in 2012 after graduating from the Reserve Academy in May, 2011. Officer Pratt successfully completed the Field Training Officer program in December. Pratt and Lambert volunteered a total of 1,223 hours in 2012. Sergeant Jake Opgenorth is the Reserve Officer Coordinator.

Chaplain

Pastor Matthew McNelly (Pullman Presbyterian Church) has been the Pullman PD Chaplain since February 2010. Pastor McNelly is a volunteer resource for the Pullman community as well as police department support staff, officers and their families. In their work, law enforcement officers are called to respond to a variety of situations that may place considerable emotional and mental stress on the officer and their families. Chaplain McNelly provides emotional and spiritual support for officers, non-commissioned support staff, and families through various forms of counseling. Counseling visits may occur as Matt accompanies an officer in their vehicle during a patrol shift, meeting at the police station before or after a shift, or outside of regularly scheduled work hours when the need arises.

Another primary role Matt serves as Chaplain is to make death notifications to next of kin when a loved one has been involved in a fatal accident or a sudden/unattended death. He also offers assistance to crime victims and their families when police are responding to a call or actively investigating a crime. Chaplain McNelly is on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to assist officers in any incident where they feel community members affected by a crime or emergency may benefit from a caring, empathetic, and non-anxious presence. Matt volunteered 112 hours in 2012. The following are examples of incidents Chaplain McNelly responded to during 2012:

- Provided support to officers during the investigation of a suicide, as well as counseling those who witnessed the incident.
- Provided counsel for victims suffering emotional trauma as a result of an attempted burglary.
- Aided officers in responding to an active domestic dispute. Provided support and counsel to children present during the event.

- Counseled officers who were investigating particularly troubling criminal activity involving minors.
- Made death notifications to next of kin following the tragic death of a local youth.
- Provided care to homeless and transient individuals in the form of a warm meal, emergency shelter, communication and transportation when other community resources were unavailable.

AWARDS

The Washington State Target Zero Project awards officers throughout Washington State for their efforts in their respective communities toward traffic safety. The officers recognized in Pullman were Officer Alex Gordon for his enforcement of driving under the influence (DUI), and Officer Carl Bell for his enforcement of speeding violations.

OTHER PROGRAMS

Emergency Management

The City is required to develop and maintain a Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan (CEMP). The Chief of Police is the City's Disaster Emergency Coordinator whose responsibilities include review and update of the Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan. We began working with Whitman County and Washington State University in 2011 to develop a joint CEMP in cooperation with the State Emergency Management Division. Significant progress was made on the plan during 2012. The plan should be completed in 2013.

We participate in quarterly meetings with the Whitman County Local Emergency Planning Committee as well as quarterly meetings with the Region 9 (Eastern Washington) Coordinating Group for Emergency Managers. The Chief is the law enforcement representative for the Regional 9 Steering Committee for emergency management.

In September we participated in a table-top emergency exercise at the Pullman-Moscow Regional Airport. In June, staff attended a regional Emergency Operations Center and Emergency Communications Center training in Pullman. In August, staff attended a table-top emergency exercise at the new WSU Martin Stadium command post.

In preparation for an emergency or disaster that could impact police and fire communications, ham radio antennas were installed at the Police Department and the Pioneer Center. The Police Department is an alternate Emergency Operations Center to Whitcom, and the Pioneer Center is a designated disaster shelter. The antennas would be used by the local ARES/RACES (Amateur Radio Emergency Services / Radio Amateur Radio Emergency Service) group.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) mandates emergency management training for employees of federal, state, county and local governments. The type and extensiveness of the training required of each employee is based on their potential responsibilities during a disaster or emergency. The Police Department is continuing to coordinate efforts to ensure training compliance for all City of Pullman employees, and submits compliance reports.

Patrol Vehicles

The patrol fleet has consisted of mostly Ford Crown Victoria's. Ford discontinued production of the Crown Victoria police package the patrol cars scheduled for replacement in 2012 were replaced with Ford Police Interceptors, the new police package offered by Ford. One vehicle is a sedan (Taurus) and the other is an SUV (Explorer). Additionally, the color scheme was changed from all blue to traditional black and white.

Prescription Drug Collection Program

A prescription drug drop box was installed in the Police Department lobby in June 2010 as part of the Whitman County Prescription and Over-the-Counter Drug Disposal Plan.

Summer Reading Program

Officers Ruben Harris and Heidi Lambley participated as preschool story time guest readers in the Neil Public Library Summer Reading Program in June. This program provides a great opportunity for police officers to interact with the community and build positive relationships with our youth.

Website & Social Media

Content to the Police Department website was increased during 2012. In April, the Police Department Facebook page was launched, providing information on critical incidents, safety alerts and tips, requests to help identify suspects, and community events. Facebook is used on conjunction with Twitter and our website to provide relevant and timely information to the public. During 2012, we sent out 115 "Tweets" and ended the year with 608 "followers". Facebook ended the year with 253 "Likes". One Facebook post requesting help with identifying a suspect photo received 407 views.

GRANTS

Bulletproof Vest Partnership (BVP) Grant

In 2011, the Police Department was awarded a Department of Justice grant to reimburse up to 50% of the cost to replace three expired bulletproof vests for law enforcement officers. Bulletproof vests have a life cycle of 3-5 years before they expire and must be replaced. The funds totaling \$1,850 were received in March 2012. We reapplied for the grant again in 2012 and were awarded reimbursements for sixteen additional vests that will expire over the next two years. The reimbursement amounts will be determined after the purchases are made.

Campus Police Training Grant

The Police Department is a sub-grantee of a Department of Justice, Office of Violence Against Women grant obtained by WSU to reduce domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking on campus. The grant runs three years from October 2011 to September 2014. In 2012, the department received \$1,959 for overtime costs associated with officers attending grant mandated training on the investigation of domestic violence, sexual assaults, stalking and harassment.

Department of Justice Drug Task Force

The Police Department is a sub-grantee of a Department of Justice (DOJ) grant that seeks to offset a portion of salary, benefits, and other costs associated with the assignment of a detective to the Quad Cities Drug Task Force (QCDF). In June 2011, grant funds were reduced and we were unable to receive any reimbursement through September 2012. When the grant was renewed in September, additional funds became available and the Police Department received \$3,000 in grant funds for QCDF participation from October to December of 2012.

Department of Justice Smart Policing Initiative Grant

The Police Department was awarded a Department of Justice "Smart Policing Initiative" grant in the amount of \$300,000 in September 2011. The two-year grant proposes to address violent crimes and neighborhood disorders through the use of video cameras placed at public locations where we experience a high frequency of those types of incidents. The Washington State Institute for Criminal Justice at Washington State University (WSU), in partnership with the Department of Criminal Justice and Criminology, is a sub-grantee. WSU faculty and staff are working with us in areas of program implementation, crime analysis, statistics, and performance measures. Three public meetings were conducted to obtain community input for camera use policy development. Research identified the Adams Mall area as the best location for the cameras. Camera installation began in December.

Services Training Officers and Prosecutors

The Police Department is a sub-grantee of the Services Training Officers and Prosecutors (STOP) grant issued to the Whitman County Prosecutor's Office by the Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women. We received \$4,995 in reimbursements in 2012 for overtime costs associated with the investigation of domestic violence, sexual assaults, stalking and harassment involving teenaged and adult female victims at the hands of male perpetrators.

State of Washington Department of Labor & Industries SHIP Grant

The Police Department was awarded a Department of Labor and Industries Safety and Health Investment Projects (SHIP) grant in June in the amount of \$31,517. The one-year grant will address decreasing musculoskeletal problems in law enforcement officers through workplace ergonomics. Specifically, the Police Department will be evaluating a range of duty belt suspension systems, office chairs, and patrol vehicle seat modifications. In 2012, the department received \$15,547 for purchase of initial equipment to be evaluated.

Washington State Traffic Safety Committee (WSTSC)

The Police Department received \$2515 as reimbursement for overtime costs associated with DUI emphasis patrols and \$732 as reimbursement for overtime costs associated with seat belt emphasis patrols from a Washington State Traffic Safety Committee (WSTSC) grant in

2012. Additionally, the department received \$454 reimbursement from the WSTSC for overtime costs for a department trained Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) to respond and conduct under the influence of drugs evaluations.

Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC)

The Police Department was awarded a \$3,000 WASPC Traffic Safety Equipment grant in January a radar unit. The funds were received and expended in 2012.

POLICE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Since its formation in 1992, the Pullman Police Advisory Committee (PAC) has met regularly to represent and communicate the public health and safety concerns of the Pullman community to the Chief of Police. The PAC is an important resource to the Chief. The Committee constantly strives to find new and better ways to connect with and represent their constituencies and to provide education about policing issues in the City of Pullman.

Lentil Festival

For the past six years, the Pullman Police Advisory Committee has sponsored an information booth at the annual Lentil Festival Friday Night Street Fair. This provides the PAC with an opportunity to be more visible to members of the community; to solicit citizen comments, suggestions and concerns; and to provide educational materials of interest to Pullman citizens.

From 2009 through 2012, the PAC joined with the Washington State University Police Advisory Board at the Lentil Festival. All questions or suggestions received at the Lentil Festival were addressed on the Committee's web site and/or by email. At the PAC Lentil Festival booth, Committee members demonstrated the effects of different levels of intoxication using a new

set of Fatal Vision goggles (beer goggles), purchased by the Pullman Police Department with funds donated by the ASWSU and the Kiwanis Club of Pullman.

CITY ORDINANCES

Fighting

A fighting and disorderly conduct ordinance was adopted in April 2008. The ordinance created a civil infraction for causing, involving or engaging in any fight, brawl or other violent or threatening behavior. In addition, the ordinance prohibits any act which tends to create or incite either a violent response and/or an immediate breach of peace. First offenders are fined \$250; subsequent offenses require a mandatory court appearance and carry a minimum \$500 fine and a maximum \$1,000 fine

We utilize a number of variables to measure the impact of our efforts to control fighting. Those variables are reported assaults, disorderly conduct incidents, and citizen dispute incidents. The table below displays those reported incidents annually from 2007 through 2011.

Open Container in Public

In 2007 the City Council adopted an ordinance prohibiting any person to consume any alcohol or have in their possession any opened alcohol containers on any sidewalks, streets or public place within the city or in any vehicle on public streets. This was in response to recognition that alcohol abuse is directly related to community safety issues including assaults, disorderly conduct, and citizen disputes. The first violation results in a fine of no less than \$250 and a fine for a second and subsequent violation is no less than \$500. The table below displays infractions issued annually from 2007 through 2012.

The ordinances requiring residential rental unit and commercial business registration with the Police Department became effective January 1, 2010. The management of these programs was added to the responsibilities of the Police Department Records.

Taxi Licensing

An ordinance requiring taxicab owners and operators to obtain a license from the City was adopted in 2010. Background investigations are conducted for each applicant, which can result in a denial or revocation of licenses based upon criteria specified in the ordinance. In August the fees for both the initial license and the renewal license were increased to \$100 to properly reflect the actual cost of processing those licenses.

CRIME STATISTICS

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)

Since 1930, the FBI has collected and compiled data to best depict total crime and to provide the most meaningful data to police administrators through the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. Originally designed as a summary system to collect only the most serious offense within an incident, the FBI UCR Program has been the national standard for a reliable crime statistics. The UCR system utilizes ten crimes, identified as "Part I" offenses, that are the crimes most likely to be reported and most likely to occur with sufficient frequency to provide an adequate basis for comparison.

National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS)

The FBI initiated the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) in 1989. Through NIBRS, law enforcement agencies report data on each offense and arrest within 23 offense categories made up of 49 specific crimes called "Group A" offenses. In comparison to UCR data, the NIBRS data provides a more comprehensive analysis of reported crime. For example, NIBRS collects data on multiple crimes that occur during a single event, while UCR collects data on only the most serious crime that occurs during a single event.

Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC)

Law enforcement agencies in Washington State submit their crime data to the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC), who in turn submits the data to the FBI. WASPC has championed an effort to obtain NIBRS participation from all Washington State law enforcement agencies. As of 2012, Washington State is about 90% compliant. NIBRS data for the Pullman Police Department is available from 2006 forward. Up until 2011, WASPC has been disseminating UCR crime data for Washington State law enforcement agencies. Beginning with 2012, WASPC will provide only NIBRS data for crime statistical reporting.



